Name in Heritage Language: 罗倩婷

Ethnic Origin: Chinese

Phonetic Pronunciation: Chris-teen Chee-yen Teeng Low

Preferred Pronouns: She / her / hers

Story of my Name: My parents chose my Chinese name first, then found an American name that sounded similar. My Chinese name means graceful and feminine; while I don't feel that way all the time, I acknowledge that it was my parents' hope for me to move through the world with ease and grace. My middle name, like that of most Asian American people, is my name in my heritage language but spelled phonetically. Many have asked what the Q stands for in my initials and I am always happy to share the story of my name!

Story of my Name: Hạnh is a very popular female name as it is one of the four virtues of a woman (công, dung. Ngôn, Hạnh) Hạnh means proper conduct for a woman or virtuous. Tuyết means snow. So combined Tuyết Hạnh means pure virtue. Nguyêñ Is the surname of the king. People took on the king's surname. I am however a descendant of the Nguyêñ Dynasty on my mother's side of the family. My grandmother used to play at the royal palace as a child. She told stories of the Princess handing out

candy and money to her and the other children at the palace. The Princess was my great, great Aunt.

Swallows are nostalgic for me because we used to sell swallow nest drinks at our family store, and they were such a yummy, nutritious treat growing up!

Phonetic Pronunciation: Victoria Ping/Fahng shih jenn

Story of my Name: The Chinese character for my last name is 方, which like many other characters is pronounced differently depending on the dialect spoken. In Mandarin, the character is pronounced Fahng or in Cantonese it is pronounced Fong. One of the dialects spoken by my dad's family is Teochew, which is why his last name was P'ng

(pronounced Pung) when he was born in Malaysia. When he emigrated to the US, the apostrophe was dropped to avoid confusion and the pronunciation was Americanized to Ping.
